

Eligible Medical Expenses: IRS Publication #502 defines medical expenses as "the costs of diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease, and the costs for treatments affecting any part or function of the body." IRS Publication 969 also describes HSA eligible expenses. The following list, while not intended to be all inclusive, illustrates medical or medical-related expenses which may be reimbursed tax-exempt under a Health Savings Account. Section 213(d) of the Tax Code contains the full provisions of the applicable taxdeductions.
